1. **Nathan MARBLE**^{1,2} was born in 1789 in Halifax, Vermont.³⁻⁵ In 1850 he was Merchant in Mentz, Cayuga Co., NY.⁵ He died on 22 Apr 1868 in Port Byron, NY.³ He emigrated Spring 1825 from To Port Byron from Schaghticoke.³
From tombstones, Mt Pleasant Cemetery, Port Byron, NY:

Nathan died 22 Apr 1868 age 79 yrs "Father"
Adeline died 31 Jan 1874 age 72 yrs "Mother"

Located in Village of Port Byron, NY.

Copied in 1964 by Daniells and Crosby. DEC found the grave markers 18 Jun 2002. They are substantial, big, made from good marble and detailed carving.

Nathan Marble came in from Schaghticoke, Rensselear county, in the spring of 1825, and opened a store in the building which stood on Main street, a little south of the printing office, which had been erected a few years previously for a store-house and was connected with the canal by a slip large enough to float the boats of that period. He succeeded admirably and continued the business till his death five or six years since. A Mr. Holmes, also from Rensselear county, and distantly related to Marble, came in about the same time and opened a like store on the corner of Main and Rochester streets. The canal was later moved about two miles north, widened and it put the village at parade rest.

Adeline is Nathan's second wife. 06/02/2000. I assume the first wife was named Esther and she died 20 Apr 1821 in Rensselear Co., NY and is buried in Elmwood, Morning Sun Twp, Schaghticoke Town, New York. Nathan Marble married Esther Wickes ?? she was born 1789. She could have been an Albany girl. Plus Nathan gave stock to an Esther Freer which ticked off Adeline, and she made adjustments in her will to compensate her other two living daughters, as it seems Esther left that stock to Laura Frances Matson. ESTHER FREER WAS A CHILD OF A FIRST MARRIAGE. SO, DAUGHTER ESTHER WICKES MARBLE MARRIED A FREER AND MOVED TO CHICAGO. THERE ARE FREER BURIALS IN SCHAGHTICOKE, NY.

1812 Nathan lease says from the city of Albany, NY He was 23 years old
1818 Nathan lease says from town of Schaghticoke, NY He was 29 years old. He buried Esther in Schaghticoke in 1821.
1834 Nathan in town of Port Byron/Mentz, NY Sold Jonathan's land (his father) in Halifax, VT to Phebe Stanton of Colrain, County of Franklin, State of Massachusetts. (Colrain is about 12 miles SE of Halifax). He was 45 years old. I assume as he was the youngest child, he had the job of doing the chores. DEC

Tracking data for Nathan. Born Halifax, VT about 1789, in Albany, NY about 1812, was in Schaghticoke, NY about 1818, buried Esther in Schaghticoke 1821, married Adeline in Troy, NY 1822, 1825 was in Port Byron, NY, died 1868 Port Byron.

Schaghticoke 1 - was formed as a district, March 24, 1772, and as a town, March 7, 1788. Pittstown was taken off, March 7, 1788, and a part of Lansingburgh in 1819. It lies on the Hudson, in the NW corner of the co. The surface is primarily a rolling upland, about 200 feet above the river. The summits of the hills in the S. are 800 feet above tide. Hoosick River, flowing through the n. part, is bordered on a portion of its course by steep banks 200 feet high. On this stream, at the mouth of Tomhannock Creek, is a beautiful circular valley, three-fourths of a mi. in circumference, and bounded on nearly ever side of steep hills.² The soil is generally a fertile, sandy or gravelly loam. Considerable manufacturing is carried on in town.³ Schaghticoke Point (Schaghticoke P.O.) contains a pop. of 1148. Schaghticoke Hill contains 25 houses, The Borough 8, Junction (p.v.) 17, and Old Schaghticoke 6. About 1640, Gov. Andros settled a remnant of the Pequots and other Eastern tribes, under the name of "Schaghticoques," in this town, on land given them by the Mohawks, as a barrier against the Northern Indians.⁴ By the charter of 1686 the city of Albany was allowed to purchase of the natives 500 acres of land in this town; but, neglecting to do so, Hendrick Van Rensselear obtained the same privilege in 1698. He sold his right to the city the next year, and in 1707 and Indian deed was obtained for a tract 6 mi. square, mostly within the limits of the town. In Oct. 1709, the city conveyed the land to actual settlers.⁵ The early settlements suffered greatly from Indian hostilities. A fort was built in 1746 at Old Schaghticoke and garrisoned by 2 companies of soldiers. The whole settlement was abandoned on the approach of Burgoyne; but, through the influence of the royalists, the place was not burned, though held for some time by the British and Hessian outposts.⁶ The Schaghticoke Seminary was incorp. May 4, 1836. The first church (Ref. Prot. D.) was formed in 1714.⁷

1 Pron. "Skat-i-kook." In old documents it is variously spelled "Schetekoke," Schactekoke," "Scahwahook," and "Schagcoque." It is said to be an Algonquin word, meaning "landslide." The Stockbridge Indians called it [the rest of this line

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is illegible].

2 A small stream called the Dwaas Kil (stream running both ways) flows from the Hudson into the mouth of the Hoosick. When Hoosick River suddenly rises, the current of this stream is often changed; and it is not uncommon to see it running n. in the morning and s. at night. - Fitch's Ag. Surv. Wash. Co., 1849, p. 939.

3 The manufactures consists of cotton and linen goods, flax, powder, plaster, and agricultural implements.

4 A portion of these removed to Kent, Conn., in 1728, and the remainder, numbering 400, joined the French in Canada.

5 These were Johan de Wandelaer, Jr., John Heermans Vischer, Corset Voeder, Daniel Kittlehuyn, Johan Knickerbacker, Louis Viele, and Derick Van Veghten, who went there to reside, and were joined soon after by Martin de Lamont, Wouter Quackenbosch, Peter Yates, David Schuyler, Wouter Groesbeck, Philip Livingston, Ignace Kip, Cornelius Vandenberg, and many others, whose descendants still reside in the vicinity.

7 A new church was built in 1760, and Rev. Elias Bunschooten was installed pastor. Newspaper notice of death. Friends of the deceased are invited to attend his funeral at his late residence on Saturday 25th inst at 2 PM. Dtd 24 April 1868.

Counting the hair around my navel. Nathan was married to Esther Wickes? Esther died Apr 1821. Louisa, Adeline's sister was married in 1820 to Joseph Wickes, Esther's relative, in some way. Nathan met Adeline via Joseph Wickes or Louisa and needing a wife, married her 19 Feb 1822. There was at least one child, Esther Wickes Marble born 11 Jan 1819 in Schaghticoke, NY via the Esther union. DEC

From the History of Rensselaer Co, by Sylvester in 1880:

* In 1809, Consider White was a Fire Warden of the village of Troy, Second Ward.

*"William Witbeek, the present proprietor, has been in charge about 6 years. A man named Shoemaker kept a pioneer tavern in the village of Bath over half a century ago, on the corner near the ferry, where the town clerk's office now is. He was succeeded by James Van Valkenburgh, and then by John Van Valkenburgh, John Bates, and Asa Bigelow."

Obituary of Asa Bigelow - appeared Troy Daily Whig July 24, 1849; 3:1.

"In this city on the 20th instant, of a cutaneous disease, with which he had been afflicted for several years, ASA BIGELOW, Esq., aged 79 years and 8 months. The subject of this notice was a native of Brookfield, Mass., from which place he removed to Worthington, and followed the business of a merchant; and was respected for his rigid integrity, and honorable conduct and probity. He was appointed postmaster at that place, under Thomas Jefferson. He removed to this city in 1803 or 4, and for several years was a merchant in company with Consider White, then a resident here. During a residence here of 45 years, he has merited the respect and esteem of his numerous acquaintances, and lived the life of a righteous, godly and upright man. Possessing peculiar notions on the subject of religion, he never joined any particular sect; but by his example sought to impress upon his family and friends, that to seek for truth in all things, and live as nearly as possible the life of an upright man, would ensure that reward which is promised to the righteous."

Obituary of Hannah Bigelow - appeared Troy Daily Whig Jan 20 and 21, 1858; 3:1.

January 20:
"In this city, on the 19th inst., HANNAH H. BIGELOW, aged 83 years, widow of Asa Bigelow, Esq., formerly of this city."

January 21:
"In this city, on the 19th inst., HANNAH H. BIGELOW, aged 83 years, widow of Asa Bigelow, Esq., late of this city. Funeral to-day (Thursday) at 2 o'clock P.M. at the Third St. Baptist Church. Friends and acquaintances of the deceased are invited to attend without further notice."

The H is for Hawkins.

From 1840-49 Asa lived at 48 Ferry St, in a fine Greek revival house which no longer exists. In the Troy city directory he is listed as a saw filer.

Asa was a founding member of the Free Masons Lodge in Cheshire, Berkshire MA in 1794. The building is now a museum and there is a plaque there with the names of both Asa and Consider as founding members. If you write to the Masonic Lodage in MA they will send you some photos.

In the Troy City Directories 1829-1849 Asa Bigelow is listed as a Saw Filer whose residence was at 48 Ferry Street. He is not listed after 1849 nor is the name of Hannah Bigelow listed as a widow after this time.

Asa and Hannah are not listed in the wills of the Renssel-er County Surrogates* Court records.

The only reference we have for Consider White is that he was a fire warden in the 2nd Ward of the Village of Troy from the years of 1809-1812. I am sure that he is the Consider White who left Troy to Greenwich, KY (Washington Co) and started a Store and Tavern in that community.

Dear David,

I made some calls today, talked to some interesting people. The not so good news is that 100 years of Cheshire history covering the time period you're interested in was destroyed. (per Cheshire Town Clerk)

The Lodge founded by Asa was a small one, no longer in existence, with almost no records. I have a request in to the Grand Lodge in Boston for more info. I spoke with a Cheshire Mason, who has referred me to another Cheshire Mason--and he wasn't in his tractor repair shop when I called.

The Berkshire Athenaeum in Pittsfield has a Berkshire Room with all sorts of old documents and records. I'll stop there Wednesday before work if I have time. A quick look through their indexes didn't turn up your names.

The Town Clerk in Cheshire seems to control what local records there are, and she asked me to write to her with the info I'm looking for. I will.

No response from a phone call to Worthington Historical Society contact, but I usually see her Thursday mornings in person, so I'll at least talk to her then.

Cheshire is in Berkshire County. Worthington is in Hampshire County

So, Asa was the first postmaster in Worthington. The dates are unclear: he served for 9 years. The first account rendered by Asa was July 1796. Another quote had a line of stages established in the hilltowns Dec, 1793, and not long after that a post office was established in Worthington

There is an article about the Franklin Lodge of Stafford Hill and its 160 members, June 9, 1794. Both Asa and Consider White's names are listed. "Franklin Lodge always held its convocations or meetings on Stafford's Hill on the first Monday before the full of the moon. This was a necessity, as its membership was scattered all over the northern and central portions of the county.....These quarters proved most acceptable to the membership coming thither on horseback from long distances and often through wilderness and storm, as when once reached it was a home on Lodge nights in which themselves and animals found food and shelter, while their convocations were held under the same roof." Hi David,

Another morning of tax investigation---I found the rest of the assessor's records, and basically saw Asa in 1801, 1802, 1803, 1804. Not in 1805. There were militia taxes, highway taxes, poll taxes, real estate taxes, personal estate taxes, and income taxes, all paid yearly. Some things never change.

Ted Porter called me back. He read from a "book" written by his brother on the chronology of general stores in Worthington. The gist of it is--in 1796 Asa recently became the first postmaster in Worthington. In 1805, his wife Abigail, age 28,, died in childbirth. Brothers Ward bought the store for \$815 and tore it down to avoid competition, and Asa Bigelow moved to Troy.

I asked Ted to make a copy of that for you, and I also asked him to contact his brother in Cooperstown NY to find out where this information came from. Neither of them have e-mail. SO FAR NOTHING 07/05/2003.

The information I have is from "Isaac Willey of New London, CT and His Descendant@'by Henry Willey, 1888. I do have more Matson family information, however.

"William Agur Matson was the son of Roderick and Catherine Wells Matson born 14 April 1819, married at Port Byron (NY), 10 July 1847, Laura Frances Marble, who was born there I January 1828. He graduated at Geneva, now Hobart College, NY, in 1843; ordained deacon in the Protestant Episcopal Church, by Bishop de Lancey, in 1846, and priest in 1847; received the degree of D. D. from Hobart College in 1865; editor of Gospel Messenger, Utica, N.Y., 1849-1859; and of Church Journal, New York City, 1872-1878, and of other publications. An index for the 1870 U.S. Census did not list Paul as a resident anywhere in New York State. He is, however, recorded in the Auburn City Directories, 1871-1872, 1873-1874 as a city resident living with his Mother and Grandmother, working as a bookkeeper ~ By 1875 Paul is again listed as a resident of Mentz, N.Y.S. Census, p. 3, #19-19, apparently married to twenty-four year old Caroline, a native of Wayne County. Eight year old Willie Brown, also a native of Wayne County, resides with them. Although this census recorded Willie as "son," and the 1880 U.S. Census, Mentz, p. 1 63, showed him as Mary Seymour J s grandson, I think he may have been Caroline Seymour's child from a previous marriage/relationship.

Although it is far from proof that the event did not occur, the indices for the Auburn Daily Bulletin did not include a marriage notice for Paul Seymour in the 1870's. However, articles that were cited in those indices do call into question the nature of Paul Seymour's marital status. You will note, too, that Willie, was recorded as Willie and William Brown in the 1875 and 1880 censuses, respectively. Additionally, the fact that Willie was not mentioned in Mary A. Seymour's will cast further doubt on the idea that he was really Paul's son.

Since Paul did not appear in Mentz in the 1892 N. Y. S. Census, and was not recorded as an heir in his Mother's will, it seemed safe to assume that he had died in the interim. Fort Hill Cemetery Records show that Paul Seymour died February 20, 1883.

The Auburn Daily Advertiser carried a small article on February 24, 1 883, (enclosed), noting the cause of death as tuberculosis.

The Auburn paper appears to have picked up the notice from the Port Byron Chronicle. Unfortunately, copies of the Port Byron paper are not available for that date. I looked at the Cayuga Chief, a Weedsport paper, but did not find anything about Paul Seymour's death. Notice, it was Paul's Mother who held the ten thousand dollar insurance policy on Paul, and neither his wife nor Willie were mentioned. I am puzzled about the article stating that Paul was buried in Oakwood Cemetery. According to the N. Y. S. Cemeteries Name/IDcation Inventory, (compiled by the Association of Municipal Historians of N.Y.S., 1995-1997), there are two cemeteries with that name in the state; one is in Delaware County, the other in Madison County.

While searching for Marble and Seymour entries in the abstract indices for the Auburn Daily Bulletin at Seymour Library, I came across a curious article from the front page of the December 23, 1874 edition which I have enclosed. A Paul Seymour and Delia Brown of Auburn were mixed up in the "organized plunder" of baggage on the N.Y. Central Railroad. A search of the Auburn Daily Advertiser finally yielded a small article about this on 8 December 28, 1874, but it did not mention the locals involved in that burglary ring. I have included it anyway. Was this Mary A. Seymour's son? Without more evidence, I can't prove it incontrovertibly. Still, I tend to think it was. The Auburn City Directories, 1870-1877, do not list any Paul Seymour as a resident of Auburn, except for Jonathan and Mary A. Marble Seymour's son, Paul, who appeared as a resident of Auburn 1871-1874. Could this be the reason they moved back to Port Byron in 1875?

Too bad that the Port Byron Chronicle is unavailable for that period. Regardless of whether that was Mary Seymour's son, her son Paul did die in February of 1883, and I do not believe he had any children of his own. Have you tried" ..--to trace descendants of any other of Nathan and Adeline's grandchildren? I contacted Hobart Library with the hope that they had information on their alumni. I found it odd, but their knowledge of William Matson was limited to his education there.

The 1887 article that your grandfather published in Scientific American (Vol. 57, pp. 264-265) contains a list of 24 families and 37 species occurring in Central Texas. He apparently made his observations during the summer as he gives eggs dates of July and August for some species. With regard to the roadrunner, he noted that it "is often taken when young and easily domesticated." This is an interesting observation that I have never seen in any other source. Nowhere in the 1887 article is there any mention of why he had come to Texas and exactly where the observations were made. I do not have a copy of the original article but have this information in the notes that I made several years ago.

In the 1888 paper (Scientific American, Vol. 58, p. 263) it is mentioned that the canyon wren was seen near "Bee Rocks" near Meridian, TX, in the valley of the Bosque River. This same species of wren was later seen near Comanche Peak in Hood County and a week later on the Paluxy Creek.

The above is virtually all that I know regarding your grandfather's ornithological tour of Texas during the 1880s. I will perhaps contact the Washington Museum of Natural History to determine if they have any of his specimens that were collected in Texas.....Stan Casto

Dear Mr. Cummins,

I recently came across your inquiry of December 1999 regarding Adeline Marble (1831-1911) who married Cyrus Lyon Hasbrouck and whose first son was Edwin Marble Hasbrouck.

My interest is in the son, Edwin Marble, who apparently spent some time in Central Texas during the mid-1880s and in 1887 and 1888 published two short reports in Scientific American regarding the birds of the region. These articles were of a general nature but Edwin later (1891 and 1893) published two technical papers, one on owl taxonomy and the other on the status of the Carolina Parakeet. He then, apparently, abandoned ornithology to enter the medical profession. A photograph of Hasbrouck is found in the Ruthven Deane Collection of Photographs of Ornithologists in the Library of Congress.

Some weeks ago, I received a request for information about Hasbrouck from a bird enthusiast in Washington State. This inquiry stimulated my interest to learn more about Hasbrouck's activities. Over the years, I have published a number of historical papers on ornithology in early Texas and would like to learn more about this pioneer observer. Any information or reference that you could provide would be greatly appreciated.

Bro. Simpson writes me that I have been on the list of the "missing" for quite some time and the object of diligent search. It is fortunate for me that I am not a fugitive from justice, if I were, I would have to say as most of 'em do eventually—"well, they've got me at last."

I presume after my long "disappearance" you will want a short synopsis of my peregrinations—so here goes. After leaving Syracuse I joined the U. S. Geological Survey — accompanying parties into southwestern Virginia, eastern Kentucky, Texas and Georgia. Later I studied medicine and graduated at Georgetown Medical in 1895. Served as interne at St. Timothy's Hospital in Philadelphia, and then went into private practice at Washington, D. C., devoting my entire time to surgery. Was married in 1897 to Harriet A. Was honorably discharged and returned home to try and pick up the threads of a disrupted practice, but it just couldn't be done. The "stay-at-homes" had grabbed it all. I obtained a job on the medical staff of the Veterans Administration where I have been for the past sixteen years.

I will be seventy years old in July of this year (something I don't like to think of), and will be retired for age from Federal service on July 17th of this year.. Expect to return to Washington, D. C. to live.

I have two hobbies — hunting and fishing, and care nothing for any other forms of sport. All my spare time and TOoney^are devoted to these. The first visit of Dorothy to New York City.

On Friday the seventeenth of May I went to Washington to request that I be given duty on the U.S.S. Leviathan (transport). I was promised one trip on her. Immediately I went out to the Hausbrouck's to be with my future wife until nearly midnight. While there and talking idly about her going back to New York with me, we of a sudden began to seriously consider her making the trip. After exerting all the force we could muster toward persuading the mother into letting Dot go to New York, we got the permission and all plans were completed. I was to leave at midnight and reach New York for enough ahead of her to have all my packing completed by the time she reached Pennsylvania Station at 1:57 the following p.m.

I got packed up, telephoned her Aunt Fannie, made arrangements to meet her before the train came in, and at a few minutes before two o'clock arrived in the Penn Station. After a wait of a few minutes, Aunt Fannie came also, and together we went down to welcome the little stranger to the big wicked city.

The train which brought her had felt so elated over the high honor given it by her presence that it just naturally kicked aside its schedule and in its enthusiasm got to the station 10 or 12 minutes ahead of time. We found the kid and all were merry. After staging a surprise for auntie in the form of a kiss, we all started for the exit.

Time out was taken for the travel stained wanderer to change waists. Then auntie showed how good was her memory of her younger days by an absolute refusal to have anything to do with us. She went her way and left us to go where our desires should lead.

The narration of what I did now becomes the description of the happenings in Dot's life. No attempt will be made here to write down the utmost details of what we did or to tell of the impressions they gave me, but I shall merely give an outline of events.

Subway to 42nd St.
Hotel Astor to cash check
Buy tickets on 42nd St.
5th Ave. to see Red Cross parade, crowd too big
To Strand Theatre via department store, telegram to Washington during show
Walked up and down Broadway
Strand roof dining and dance
To Princess Theatre to see Oh Lady, Lady (late)
To midnight frolic (dance)
Taxi to 84th St.
In at 1:55 a.m. and a good night kiss

After leaving Dot I started downtown on the subway, and while in route decided to go aboard the receiving ship for the night. The next morning I learned my orders for the Leviathan had come. I made final preparations, called her on the phone after reaching Hoboken, got an invitation to dinner at Aunt Fannie's and stopped in at Price's to get ready. Reached 117 about 2 o'clock and my actions started coinciding with Dot's again. I met her uncle and found him to be a most lively chap. Hardly had I been introduced, but he landed on me with the exclamation that I had to kiss my fiancée. Something entirely foreign to reluctance being present within me, I did the little stunt.

We talked for a while.

Dot and myself went off up front to play the Victrola while dinner was being prepared.

Had dinner (about 3:45) .

Played and danced with the Crookstons and Rives for quite a while.

Started for Brooklyn after my trunk. Ride in subway to downtown district about Brooklyn Bridge over in surface car. The long ride to the taxi company. The Navy Yard. My trunk. Over Manhattan Bridge. The ferry to Hoboken. Land the trunk. Tube to 33rd St. New York. Walk up Broadway. Dinner at Shanleys. To the Strand movies. Subway home to Aunty's. On the landing outside before ringing for entrance. Transcribed by Dorothy and Susan 23 Feb 2003. Source, one of David Cummins was little notebooks.

Navy Blimp J-3 crashed while searching for survivors of the naval air ship USS Akron, fatally injuring Lieutenant Commander David Ervin Cummins and Aviation Chief Metalsmith Pasquale Bettio on 4 April 1933 (<http://www.history.navy.mil/faqs/faq102-2.htm>, accessed 15 May 2005).

On the evening of 3 April 1933, the Akron departed Lakehurst for a routine training flight. There was nothing in the weather forecast which would indicate trouble. Yet within hours the ship had been enveloped in a severe cold front. The ship turned east to ride out the storm at sea off the New Jersey coast (<http://www.nlhs.com/fleet.htm> accessed 15 May 2005).

Just after midnight the air became quite turbulent and the Akron was carried downward. Drooping of emergency ballast fore and full speed on all engines stopped the descent at seven hundred feet. The Akron soon returned to its cruising of sixteen hundred feet. Two to three minutes later the Akron was caught in another down draft. With the altimeter reading eight hundred feet the ship lurched sharply, as if a strong gust had hit it. The rudder man then reported no response from his wheel. The men in the control car braced for impact with the ocean. The only survivor from the control car saw the waves below him and was washed out of the control car moments later.

There had been no impact of the lower fin with the sea before the control car hit the ocean. The reason for this apparent anomaly was that the fin was already in the ocean. The lurch which all had assumed was a gust, and which the altimeter would seem to insist was just that, was actually the lower fin hitting the water. No one realized the severity of the low pressure system through which the Akron was flying. The low caused her barometric altimeter to read as much as several hundred feet higher than the actual altitude. The Akron had literally been flown into the sea.

The Akron carried no life jackets and only one rubber raft. Most men never got out of the foundering ship, and of those who did only three survived exposure to the chilly north-Atlantic waters. Seventy three men perished.

The tragedy was compounded the next day when the blimp J-3 crashed while looking for survivors, going down with two members of its crew.

The navy had lost the finest airship in the world and seventy-five men. It was the beginning of the end for naval lighter-than-air.10

The field was named "David E Cummins Athletic Field" after my father. Soon after he was killed in the blimp accident in April 1933. I remember seeing the sign on the old field back before WW2.

The GF was a farmer. He ran for Sheriff and was Sheriff of Prescott. I do not know when. The GM was afraid for his like and made him stop. She showed me his pistol and said one day I was to have it. Of course that never happened. You got to be on site to get your stuff. She had a trunk load of material that, I guess Ruth and Mary, took and who now knows what happened to it.

My father did not want to be a farmer. There was a family in Prescott named Roseman that had a member in the USN. He was the inspiration for my father to join the USN. Later my father received a Third Alternate Appointment for the USNA. that meant the principle and the first to alternates had to fail in some way for the third to get in. Never the less, my father bought himself out of the USN (possible in those days) and attended a prep scol in Annapolis (Wertz, I think). It paid off. He passed the entrance exam and the other three failed. He went in and graduated class of 1918 in 1917 due to WW!
